Salmon is home to the oldest remaining chapter of the OES in the state of Idaho. Although it was the second chapter to be organized in the state, the first chapter, in Mount Idaho, did not last very long before it was disbanded.

Salmon's chapter, the Hugh Duncan No. 2, was chartered March 18, 1886, and the Reverend Hugh Duncan was authorized to institute the chapter. Rev. Duncan, a native of Scotland, was a resident of Sheridan Montana, who came to preach once a month to the people of Salmon. He was a past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge A.F. and A.M. of Montana and was the driving force in the creation of this chapter. In honor of the man who worked so hard to get the chapter started, the charter members voted to name it after him.

The first officers elected to serve the chapter were as follows:

Mary Kirtley [#12222/1], worthy matron Robert McNicoll, worthy patron Anna B McCaleb, associate matron Peter Van Norden, secretary

Charter members of the Hugh Duncan No. 2 chapter in 1886 were:

Mary Kirtley James L Kirtley [#12222]

The chapter held its meetings for many years in the upper story of a log building in Salmon. Later as the chapter grew more prosperous and the Masons moved to larger quarters, the chapter naturally followed. The meetings were moved to the third floor of the Pioneer Mercantile building which was owned by and housed the mercantile business of George L Shoup, the first governor of Idaho. The first story was expressly built by Mr. Shoup for the Masonic Lodge and OES meetings and was richly furnished by him and given to the Masons as a gift. The lodge held there meetings in this location for many years, until they purchased the property just across the street from it, and had it remodeled for their needs. There they were housed on the second floor, until the building burned down in 1931. They lost all their records in the fire, but managed to salvage the brick walls, which then went into building their one story building, which they were still occupying in 1961, at the time this article was written.

Most of the recordings are for Final Certificates (FC). A Final Certificate is a document that was issued by the State of Idaho stating that the Carey Act Entryman had complied with all provisions of the Carey Act Homestead law and was, therefore, entitled to a Land Patent (P). A Patent is a "Deed", which actually transfers the land title from the State to the entryman. In many cases, only the FC was recorded in the Lincoln County Records, even though a subsequent patent was issued. A Final Certificate officially bestowed equitable title to the entryman.

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Louis F. Henderson (1853-1942), Early Northwest Botanist

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Louis Henderson was one of the most important and active of our early resident northwest botanists. He collected plants in virtually every corner of the three northwestern states during 65 years in the field. He was the first American botanist to explore the Olympic Mountains of Washington, and the first to survey Idaho's Salmon River country. His tens of thousands of meticulously annotated specimens provide a detailed record of our changing plant communities. Henderson's life story is a fascinating one which demands a full-scale biography.

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- In 1895 Henderson took what he later described as "the longest botanical trip I have ever taken in my life." That summer, with funding from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, he undertook a botanical reconnaissance of central Idaho, an area then virtually unknown to science. As his assistant he chose student Charles Kirtley [#122224], a senior at the university [University of Idaho in Moscow]. The trip was commissioned by Frederick V. Coville, Curator of the U. S. National Herbarium. A complete set of plants collected by Henderson on this extensive trip are filed at the National Herbarium, an important consideration, as many of Henderson's Idaho collections were later lost.
- Henderson has described the 1895 trip with Kirtley at length in his 1932 autobiographical account, "Early Experiences of a Botanist in the Northwest," which was serialized in the Bulletin of the Native Plant Society of Oregon in 1981 and 1982. The two collected extensively from June 1 to the end of September, traveling with pack animals and a single saddle horse. They covered over a thousand miles, their itinerary including Salmon River, Lost River Mountains, Boise River, Soldier Mountains, Wood River, Ketchum, and other areas. The two men had encounters with rattlesnakes, range wars, threats of Indian uprisings, torrential rains, landslides, swollen rivers, a stage coach buried in mud, and the ubiquitous mosquitoes. They saw desolation due to mining, as well as rich, unspoiled country. On Birch Creek they helped move a ranch family into the hills to avoid Indians. Henderson's later comment was: "I botanized, Indians or no Indians."
- While at Idaho, Henderson published four articles introducing new plant species to science. He named a new Indian paintbrush he found on the 1895 trip for Coville, calling it Castilleja covilleana, and writing, "I take pleasure in dedicating this unique species to Mr. Coville, botanist of the Agriculture Department at Washington, through whose instrumentality I was enabled to take the trip." He also named a nemophila for his student assistant, calling it Nemophila kirtleyi, and writing, "I take pleasure in dedicating this species to my young friend and companion of my 1895 trip, Charles Kirtley of Salmon Idaho."
